SUBJECT: Crime Analysis Report December 2017

During the month of December 2017, the Guilford Police Department had the following **Part 1** and selected **Part 2** Crimes reported: Reference Appendix A for further information. This information was compiled via the NEXGEN system utilizing a query of all Part 1 Crimes and select Part 2 crimes from the computer database. A full review of each queried case file report was completed.

The Guilford Police Department investigated **984** cases for the month of December. This is a three percent (3%) decrease in calls from the previous month.

Burglary Cases

There were two reported Burglaries for the month of December. There was a significant Modus Operandi employed by the suspect for one incident and an arrest is pending for that case. The suspect was identified and the investigation is ongoing. The other case is an attempted burglary to a commercial property and there is also a significant Modus Operandi employed in that incident and preliminary suspect information has been developed.

This is a one hundred percent (100%) increase in burglaries from November to December.

There was no crime pattern developed due to these two cases being the lone incident of their respective type, thus no response plan was developed.

Criminal Mischief Cases:

There was a total of thirteen (13) criminal mischief cases filed for the month of December. This is a thirty (30%) percent increase in criminal mischief cases from November to December. Eleven (11) of these cases were to public property, two (2) to public property.

The times and dates reported are depicted in the graphic representation, however these are mostly the time the report was filed and not the time at which the crime is being committed. Nine of the thirteen cases show an accurate representation of the time these crimes were committed. The others were reported after the damage was observed and the exact time and date of the occurrence is unknown.

Seven of the thirteen cases involved residences being egged. The incidents all would seem to be taking place during the late evening hours on the weekends. Suspects were identified by one of the homeowners and these suspects were interviewed. There were two other cases in which a suspect was identified, however the complainants did not wish to pursue charges. C shift has been advised of the day/times of the criminal mischief and are aware of the suspect information.

There were no identifiable patterns nor significant modus operandi for the remaining criminal mischief cases.

Larceny Cases:

There were twenty-one (21) larceny cases reported during the month of December. Six (6) of the twenty-one cases were solved. There was one (1) arrest made as a result of these larceny cases. There are four (4) arrest warrant applications pending and the final case saw the complainant reimbursed and the complaint withdrawn.

The larceny types are as follows: eleven (11) thefts from a motor vehicle, three (3) shopliftings, and seven (7) general larcenies.

For thirteen (13) of these larceny cases the exact date and time that the larceny occurred has not been determined. Thus, the date and time shown reflects only that of the date/time reported.

The number of larceny cases decreased sixteen percent (16%) from November to December.

There were two (2) incidents of catalytic converters being removed from parked vehicles at the same location. The area is being analyzed and a response plan is being formulated. The thefts from motor vehicle larcenies nearly all involved items being removed from unlocked motor vehicles. The department continues to raise awareness for locking motor vehicles both through the Guilford PD Facebook page as well as citizen contacts.

Robbery Cases:

None reported.

Larceny of MV Cases:

There was one reported larceny of a motor vehicle for the month of December. The case involved the theft of a motor vehicle on the overnight. The vehicle was recovered later then next day and has since been returned to the owner. The investigation is still ongoing for this incident.

The residential burglary case for this month also involved a larceny of the victim's vehicle. That vehicle was recovered in another state and the suspect has been identified. An arrest warrant application is pending.

Aggravated Assault/Simple Assault:

None reported.

Arson Cases:

None reported.

Rape/Sex offense Cases:

There were two (2) reported sexual assaults for the month of December. Pursuant to Connecticut General Statute, the details of these cases remain confidential. One case has since been closed, the other remains an active investigation.

Murder Cases:

None reported.

Information and Intelligence received on criminal activity:


CTIC provided LEO intelligence during this month. The New England State Police Information Network also served as a source of intelligence as did the Law Enforcement Information Exchange (LInX).

Intelligence meetings were held with the Middlesex County Detective Association, New Haven ISU, and New Haven MDT in regard to ongoing criminal activity in all attending agencies' jurisdictions. The Guilford Police Department has also received information from anonymous sources for suspected criminal activity. This department has also worked in conjunction with agencies both within and outside the State of Connecticut with regard to a number of these investigations.








Appendix B - Burglary




Burglary Sector Breakdown December 2017







Appendix C-Criminal Mischief




Cases by Sector Crim. Mischief - December 2017
